



State Health Access Profile Data Documentation

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Introduction

The State Health Access Profile is a state-level profile of access to health care in the states that goes beyond indicators of health insurance coverage. SHADAC researchers identified and assembled indicators that measure state resources that enable access to health care for residents. While many sources of data on health care access exist, the State Health Access Profile includes 16 measures for each state and the District of Columbia that:

- 1) have underpinnings in the theoretical or empirical literature;
- 2) are readily available in the 50 states and the District of Columbia; and
- 3) are likely to be provided consistently in the future.

The University of Minnesota's State Health Access Data Assistance Center (SHADAC) is funded by The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation to help states monitor rates of health insurance coverage and to understand the various factors associated with access to health care.
